Course Description

This course is intended to help you learn the essentials of how to get started, what tools and equipment you'll need and where to get them, the main activities in the beekeepers year, the laws and bylaws governing keeping bees; discover the principles of sustainable beekeeping and how these principles can guide your beekeeping into an enduring practice.

- Explain what they need in order to get started in beekeeping
- Describe the laws around beekeeping in Vancouver
- Discuss the responsibilities of urban beekeepers
- Identify where to purchase equipment and demonstrate how to assemble it
- Name and identify major parts of the honeybee such as the stinger or mandibular parts
- Describe bee biology and anatomy from the perspective of managing bees
- Describe the importance of wax and identify what to look for in comb during hive inspections
