Course Description, Prerequisites, Corequisites:

English 1395 provides a substitute course and alternative credit for students who may already have credit for an English course that is being offered as part of a Field Studies program, or for students who may not have a prerequisite for a course that is part of a Field Studies program. This substitute course will reflect the topics and learning objectives of the original course in the Field Studies program.

Prerequisites: One of LET 4 (or LET 3 with strong recommendation of concurrent registration in ENGL 1121) or LPI equivalent; a minimum 80% in one of BC English 12 or BC English Literature 12 or BC English First Peoples 12; or a "C" in ENGL 1120; or an "S" in one of ENGL 1107, 1108, or 1110.

Corequisites:

Registration restricted to students admitted to the following programs: Field Study: Europe, Field Study: Gothic, Field Study: Caribbean, Field Study: Theatre (New York)

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- explore important works of literature
- evaluate and value major themes of literature
- place texts in the historical, social and political context of literature
- respond to a variety of writings in discussions, essays, and exams
- evaluate and value the place of literature in the world
- write competent analytical essays about works of literature
