Course Description, Prerequisites, Corequisites:

Using examples of literary works, plays and their adaptations as films, students will learn the principal differences between the forms, learn to abstract the visual from the literary and adapt a short story or play for filming. The course will include a study on writing for children's television and/or animation, and students may choose to write a spec script for an existing children's/animation series. Minimum output 40 pages.

Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- · write more confidently in diverse genres, subjects and story forms
- interpret a literary work for a dramatic visual medium
- find a personal point of access to a prose work
- utilize theme (controlling idea) in the adaptation of a literary work
- differentiate between characterization and deep character
- apply character entrance, contrasting characters, character development and arc, the credential scene, and character paradox in character creation
- write dialogue with subtext
- describe unique aspects of writing for children such as its relation to authority and selfempowerment, the implied moral universe, and network guidelines
- differentiate between writing for live action and writing for animation
- option and purchase a literary work to obtain motion picture/television rights
- describe copyright and how it applies to their own and other's work
- describe a basic WGC deal and business practices in the industry as they relate to writers
- identify the qualities and skills required of the working professional film and television writer
- write a sample for presentation, or as a script for production, an adapted screenplay
- write a sample for presentation or a script or production a first draft of the feature film project
