JOUR 1122: Journalism Research Techniques

Course Description, Prerequisites, Corequisites:

Students get a practical introduction to basic journalism research skills: how to find people and how to find information on people, governments, businesses and charities. They learn advanced interviewing skills and how to spot false information. Students conceptualize an investigative project using tools such as freedom of information requests and database analysis, which will be used as a foundation for further study in advanced research techniques and investigative journalism.

Students will receive credit for only one of JOUR 1120 and 1122.

Registration in this course is restricted to students admitted to the Diploma or Certificate in Journalism

Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Identify the many possible sources of information about people, charities, businesses and governments
- Define which sources of information are the most relevant for the news story or project being worked on
- Collect information on people, organizations, authority figures for the news story
- Compare information from multiple sources to create a comprehensive picture of an issue or person
- Evaluate what sources of information are the most credible and relevant
- Assess and synthesize the material collected to ensure the best information is used in news reporting

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Topics Covered:

Class 1: Think Globally, report locally: An Introduction to investigative reporting

Class 2: How to come up with investigative story ideas: Short-term vs. long-term projects

Class 3: Finding information on people – Part 1: Mining social media, using phone books, sneaky googling tricks

Class 4: Finding information on people - Part 2: Mining social media, craigslist, boolean logic

Class 5: Finding information through Courts: Court/criminal records searches as a tool (Pick your investigative topic, go over deadlines)

Class 6: FOI and ATIP: An introduction to Canadian laws and practices

Class 7: Filing FOIs, brainstorming topics for long-term projects

Class 8: Finding information through other public databases: BC Online, disciplinary agencies, American records

Class 9: Advanced Interviewing Skills: The challenging interviews, including sensitive and reluctant subjects and those who are outright hostile.

Class 10: How to find experts: determining your project topic and doing preliminary interview with expert, advocate or analyst

Class 11: Follow the Money: Private individuals, corporations, and governments, political donations, charities, bankruptcy and SEC records

Class 12: Fallacies: how to spot them, how to combat them (including when public officials lie and what to do about it.)

Class 13: Waiting for FOI: Is your FOI here yet? What other research can you do while you wait?
