### Course Description, Prerequisites, Corequisites:

Political processes, actors, and institutions are affected by the variety of factors loosely connected to the Internet and its associated platforms. In this course, students explore how digital media (social media, online chat rooms, electronic voting processes, and electronic journalism) are impacting politics in advanced liberal democracies and influencing the practice and meaning of citizenship. They examine the many ways in which technology is impacting the practice and the experience and meaning of citizenship.

Prerequisite(s): A minimum "C-" grade in one of the following: POLI 1100, 1119, 1140, 1145, 1160, 1195, or 2270; or permission of the instructor.

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to...

- articulate orally and in writing the key criteria important for democratic politics;
- distinguish the key institutional requirements for democracy;
- understand the different ways in which electoral systems and institutions of government are impacted by new digital technologies;
- compare and contrast how the current social media environment is similar to/different from other experiences of technological revolution;
- explain the significance of civil society in democratic societies and express the ways in which social media is altering civil society at the present time.

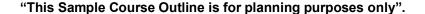
